

Enrichment: "A process for improving the environment and behavioral care of confined animals within the context of their behavioral needs" (the Society of

Animal Welfare Administrators). What does this mean in practical terms? A simple definition with profound consequences for shelter animals when not implemented consistently or correctly. The purpose of quality enrichment is to reduce animal stress, increase healthy behaviors, reduce the risk of illness (or help speed up recovery from illness) and, reduce the length of stay in our facility prior to adoption. It short, proper enrichment creates healthy, happy and well adjusted cats and dogs so that they can go to good homes in the shortest time and safest way possible.

With enrichment being so important, how do we prioritize this at **Toledo Animal Rescue**? It is no secret that a full shelter is both a positive and a negative concept. We are full because members of the human and animal community need our help. But being full not only stresses the animals out but it puts a greater importance on our Rescue team to ensure each animal gets what they need. Clean beds, fresh food and water, empty litter trays, yards free of dog waste...the daily

chores list goes on and on and takes a great deal of time and attention. The big motivator for our team to get this work done is they can then think of new and creative ways to enrich our dogs and cats.

Enrichment is fun for people and animals alike. Ever watch a kitten bat around a toy mouse? Give a dog a Kong filled with peanut butter? How about use a laser pointer in a room full of cats? All great entertainment for us and wonderful enrichment activities for them. The best part about creating activities and spaces for healthier and happier animals is the sky's the limit and we don't need to break the bank doing it.

At the **Toledo Animal Rescue**, we strive everyday to improve the lives of the cats and dogs in our care.

With proper nutrition, housing and enrichment activities, we are able to do this and more. And with each passing month, we are coming up with new and creative ways to accomplish

Jake's Update 🦴

We highlighted "Jakes Journey" in the winter issue of our newsletter. We thought everyone would like a quick update on how Jake is doing.

Quick Backstory

Jake came to us in July of 2019 from an overcrowded shelter Southeast of Columbus, Ohio. Not much is known about his time prior to coming to the Rescue, only that he had been chained outside his whole life with a number of other dogs.

After his arrival, the Rescue team discovered a large mass on Jake's hind leg. A biopsy revealed a mass to be a low-grade mast cell tumor which required surgery to remove.

Update


After recovering from surgery, his oncologist decided the best course of action would be to start Jake on 12 months of chemotherapy. It started out well, but in January we witnessed some severe.

possibly life-threatening, complications revolving around his treatments. His quality of life was declining, and it had become obvious to the Rescue team that he was not a happy pup. After consulting with his oncologist, and the Rescue's veterinarian, it was decided to end is chemotherapy. It was time to focus on giving him the best possible life with the time he has left.

After being removed from the chemo, Jake started to perk up and was back to being his sweet, loving self. When he had fully recovered from the side effects of the treatment, he was placed in a foster home. He now has a family who is home with him 24/7, four brothers and sisters who he loves dearly, and a big yard to play in. He enjoys cuddling up with his siblings, barking at the mailman, long naps

in patches of sun, and taking up the entire king-sized mattress. **He** is enjoying life, and happy to be surrounded by love!

It is estimated that Jake will have at least another 5 years of a fun-filled life. The team at the Rescue is extremely happy we were able to get to know Jake and contribute to his bright future.
